September got off to a flying start as we celebrated the academic achievements of our Year 13 students.

Seeing so many of them proudly collect their A Level and BTEC results in preparation for university or advanced apprenticeships in the weeks and months to come was certainly a moment we won't forget. Once the national A Level results were published by the DfE a few weeks later, it became clear that the progress achieved by Invictus Sixth Form students is amongst the best in the country. Compared to all multi-academy trusts in the country, we had come in the top 10! In terms of academic progress, Invictus Sixth Form beat all local schools and colleges Even more impressive were the results achieved by Kinver students and teachers. Kinver sixth form students had achieved results placing them in top spot out of 125 schools and colleges in the whole of Staffordshire, Dudley and Wolverhampton. Their progress is described by ALPS as outstanding and places them in the top 10% of all schools and colleges within the UK.

We are especially proud of Lauren Baldwin who has been accepted to study medicine and Luke Baynham who, after a gruelling interview process, received read Mathematics. PSHE lesson revolve around this topic, with students using Unifrog and UCAS to carry out research into possible courses and apprenticeships and to start drafting out their personal statements. Visits to Halesowen College for a Higher and Advanced Apprenticeships Day and the Birmingham UCAS HE Convention in June both supported students in their research and decision making process. In July, Year 12 students also took part in a residential visit to Edge Hill University. They took part in variety of workshops and taster lectures and stayed in halls of residence. This gave them a real flavour of what university life is like.

Finally, the sixth form summer ball took place on Thursday 11th July at West Midland Safari Park. Both Year 12 and Year 13 had an amazing time, dancing the night away, celebrating the end of another successful year at Invictus Sixth Form.

Year 12 students will, for the first time, be taking part in the English Speaking Board qualification in July.

This prestigious qualification tests students' research, communication and debating skills. Successful completion will reward students with UCAS points of between 24 to 30 points, depending on whether they achieve a pass, merit or distinction grade. The book is based on real events that took place in the Midlands just over a century ago; it uses the diary of an II-year-old girl to bring to life the experiences of working class children of that time.



On Sunday 28th April, Karen Salt, Administration Manager and Mr Jasper's PA at Ellowes Hall took part in this year's London Marathon.



# **SPORTING SUCCESS**






# CANDBIA TRIP REPORT BY MR FOX, HEAD OF SIXTH FORM AT KINVER HIGH SCHOOL

We then said goodbye to our new friends and went to visit Brikama hospital, the busiest hospital in the entirety of The Gambia. Whilst it was great to hand out the medical supplies and donations to the mothers that both Kinver Primary Federation and Kinver High families had donated, this was an eye-opening experience for students who could see the gulf in facilities and resources available to Gambians, and made us incredibly grateful for the care that we receive from the NHS back at home.


Despite the sombre end to Wednesday, the students returned to Mansa Colley to complete the foundations for the Science Block. As temperatures reached 42°C, the students battled on, and within a few hours the entirety of the foundations had been dug out. Both staff and students alike had exhausted themselves in

the heat, but our day wasn't yet done. We then visited a nearby orphanage school, for children who have lost one or both of their parents. We were all left speechless to see classes of over 50 students packed tightly into tiny classrooms, that had walls falling down, with virtually no resources other than a chalkboard at the front of the class. After speaking to the staff and the students here, as well as donating some resources and clothing to the school and its pupils, we would visit our final destination for the day.

We reached an orphanage near to Serekunda, which was for children who had lost both their parents, and were cared for and taught by those running it. Whilst the young children we met were excited to meet us and to receive the clothing and toys we had donated, it was also important for our students to see the harsh reality of life for some people in Gambia. We also met orphan twins, who had lost their mother due to an infection following their birth. Some of the money we have raised will go to providing them with food and care for an entire year. We will now be fundraising for both the orphanage and the orphanage school to help provide them with clean water, mattresses and teaching resources that can hopefully make a difference to the young children we met.

how much the visit had meant to them, and the difference they made to all of the groups we worked with will have a huge impact on the lives of our partner communities in Gambia, and hopefully on the attitudes of our own students here at home.

On an additional note, it was fantastic to be able to work with the Kinver Primary Federation Staff, who had done so much to raise funds and collect donations ready for this year's trip. Mr Willetts, Mrs Grove and Mrs Whiston, along with Alice Grove and Emily Whiston were brilliant throughout the entirety of the week. They threw themselves into every task, and fully immersed themselves into Gambian culture, and it was a pleasure to share their company whilst we were in Africa!

We are very grateful for all of their support and hard work, and we're really excited about continuing the partnership between our schools to help make an even bigger difference to our partner communities in The Gambia in future.

Hoping for a lasting impact, the next step is inviting a guest speaker to Pedmore High School to chat to the pupils about the importance of not carrying a knife.





The Maths department celebrated Year 9's achievements in assembly as they received their first official exam certificates.
